



Key points:

The SLR submission guidelines are here to advise potential author(s) of the key things to know when considering submitting an article to the publication. The list should not be treated as definitive, and any queries should still be addressed to the law review on the email provided.

- 1** The Strathclyde Law Review's Editorial Board welcomes submissions from students, past and present, of the University of Strathclyde who are at any stage of their academic progression.
- 2** Articles that have been written for the purpose of submission to the Review are welcomed, along with articles that were prepared as part of coursework or a dissertation. However, they should be amended to ensure they are appropriate for publication.
- 3** The article must provide a critical analysis of a particular area of law, publication or judicial decision. Your comments should be original, relevant and aim to make an interesting contribution to the academic debate.
- 4** A variety of submissions of different lengths and styles will be considered by the Editorial Board. The length noted below is a rough guideline and should be used as such to advise on a general length of the article. The specified word count also includes footnotes.
 - Case notes (500 to 1500 words on a recent judicial development)
 - Book reviews (500 to 1500 words on a recent publication)
 - Essays and short articles (1500 to 4000 words)
 - Long articles (4000 to 10,000 words)
- 5** All submissions must conform to the Strathclyde Law Review House Style (see specified document) including OSCOLA referencing and must be submitted alongside a title page and signed declaration of originality (both available as documents on the website).
